Rich in History



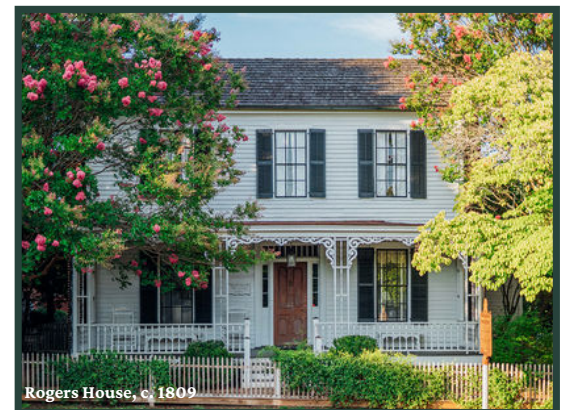
Madison is the quintessential authentic small town that overflows with Southern Charm. As a history buff's delight full of museums and authentic, immaculately preserved historic sites, discover the evolution of Madison by touring this welcoming small town.

The free, self-guided Madison Walking Tour offers visitors the opportunity to take in some of the most notable and ornate houses, churches and museums in the Madison Historic District.

Explore the streets of Madison and you'll take a picturesque trip back in time. Pristine lawns, traditional Southern landscapes and towering columns frame stately homes. The Madison Historic District, boasting one of the state's largest collections of eclectic 19th century architectural styles, contains three house museums available for tours - Heritage Hall, Rogers House and Rose Cottage.

From the story of Adeline Rose, a determined mother born into slavery, to the story of Joshua Hill, the Civil War-era senator credited with saving Madison from Sherman's devastating 1864 March to the Sea — Madison is home to endless fascinating stories that today are best told by the historic homes in which they happened.

Dive even deeper into the region's history at the Madison-Morgan Cultural Center, housed in Madison's 125-year old schoolhouse. Here visitors can learn more about the land, the people who settled it, and how they lived prior to 1900.

Outdoors Worth Exploring

Hard Labor Creek State Park

Georgia's second largest state park offers ample room to hike, bike, paddle, swim, boat, fish, camp and reconnect with nature. Newly-renovated cabins will become your home away from home as you explore more than 5,800 acres of Georgia's natural wonders. The Creek Golf Course at Hard Labor, named one of the best golf deals in the US, is known for its challenging layout in a pristine, natural setting. Hard Labor Creek State Park is a must-visit for families, adventurers and golfers alike.

Southern Cross Guest Ranch

Southern Cross has been called by Travel+Leisure one of "America's Best Dude Ranches." Day visitors and guests are invited to join horseback rides on the picturesque trails through forest and pasture. Back at the ranch's 16-room inn, guests enjoy swimming, fishing, cycling or simply relaxing on the farm. The ranch's highly trained chef and kitchen staff also serve a variety of meals including international cuisines and local favorites for lunch, dinner and special events.

Burnt Pine Plantation

Burnt Pine Plantation offers guided hunts of quail, whitetail deer, dove, pheasants, turkey and fishing on more than 4,500 acres of meticulously-managed land. This sprawling estate is home to a 28-bed lodge and conference center, an ideal location for getaways and leaving the hustle and bustle behind.

Madison-Morgan Meander

These popular country routes take cyclists through the scenic countryside on self-guided, cycle-friendly tours past farms, historic schoolhouses, favorite film sites and other great finds. Bucolic stops along the way visit historic sites and area farms that continue Georgia's agricultural traditions producing fresh, healthy products like at Rock House Farm and Creamery.

Georgia's Lake Country

Just minutes from Madison, Buckhead is Morgan County's gateway to Lake Oconee. Buckhead is home to two full-service marinas: Sugar Creek Marina and Blue Springs Marina. Georgia's Lake Country is comprised of two lakes, Lake Oconee and Lake Sinclair, and four communities ready to welcome you to the water. Boat rentals, kayaking, fishing, history and great restaurants await you at the lake.

The Farm House Inn at Hundred Acre Farm

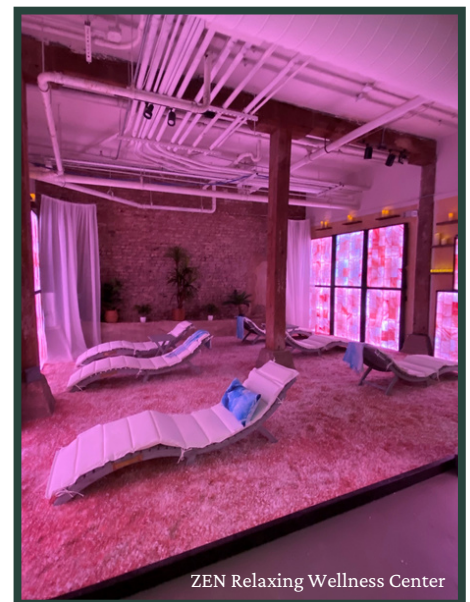

Morgan County African-American Museum

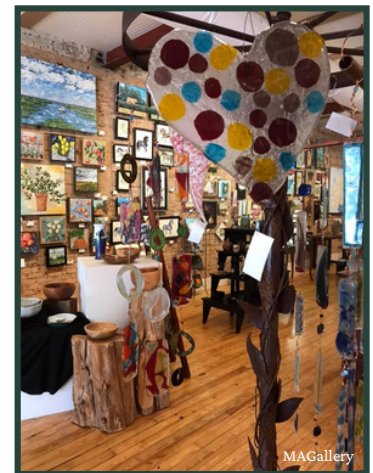

Historic Homes

The Madison Historic District is one of the largest National Register Historic Districts in the state, with more than 350 historic structures designated as contributing properties. Many were constructed in the early 19th century. Three historic house museums are open for tours.

Georgia's Lake Country

The original Buckhead, not to be confused with the Atlanta district, is an idyllic former boom town with a population of 192. It is home to two full-service marinas and is the county's gateway to nearly 800 miles of shoreline along Lake Oconee and Lake Sinclair.
